Voting in Tribal Communities

Voter Registration

- **Online Registration:** Visit <u>IWillVote.com</u> to check if online registration is available in your state. When registering, remember to register using the physical location of your home, even if you receive mail at a P.O. box.
- Mail-in Registration: You can obtain a voter registration form from your local election office, Department of Motor Vehicles, or the many state offices that provide public assistance.
- Eligibility Requirements: To register to vote, you must be at least 18, a U.S. citizen, and meet your state's
 residency requirements. Some states have additional requirements or necessary documents. Check your
 state's requirements at IWillVote.com.

Early, Absentee, and Election Day Voting

- In-Person Voting: Some states require ID to vote. Acceptable ID varies by state and may include a driver's license, Tribal ID card, or other government-issued documents. Check your state's requirements at <u>IWillVote.com</u>.
- Early/Absentee Voting: Early and absentee voting is often available for voters who are unable to vote in
 person on Election Day. You can request an absentee ballot or find an early voting place at IWIIIVote.com.
- **Ballot Collection**: Due to geographic remoteness, many Native voters rely on ballot collection. Call the DNC's Voter Protection Hotline at 1-833-336-8683 for information about your state.
