**UNDER TRUMP AND REPUBLICANS' BIG UGLY BILL, INCLUDING MEDICAID CUTS, AND THEIR REFUSAL TO EXTEND ENHANCED ACA TAX CREDITS, MILLIONS OF AMERICANS ARE EXPECTED TO BECOME UNINSURED BY 2034**

**The OBBBA Cut Medicaid By \$911 Billion Over Ten Years And Would Increase The Number Of Uninsured People By 10 Million.** “On July 4, President Trump signed into law a budget reconciliation package once called the ‘One Big, Beautiful Bill’ that made major reductions in federal health care spending to offset part of the costs of extending expiring tax cuts. The Congressional Budget Office’s (CBO) latest cost estimate shows that the reconciliation package would reduce federal Medicaid spending over a decade by an estimated \$911 billion (after accounting for interactions that produce overlapping reductions across different provisions of the law) and increase the number of uninsured people by 10 million.” [KFF, [7/23/25](#)]

### **DONALD TRUMP'S SNAP CUTS WILL CAUSE OVER 22 MILLION FAMILIES NATIONWIDE TO LOSE SOME OR ALL OF THEIR BENEFITS**

**Urban Institute: 22.3 Million Households Will Lose Some Or All Of Their SNAP Benefits Under OBBB Cuts.** “An Urban Institute analysis of all the changes in the One Big Beautiful Bill—including increased state cost-sharing requirements, expanded work requirements, and restrictions on noncitizens’ eligibility—finds that 22.3 million US families would lose some or all of their SNAP benefits. Among these families, 5.3 million would lose at least \$25 in SNAP benefits per month, and most of them would be working families and families with children.” [Urban Institute, [7/16/25](#)]

**Trump's OBBB Cut \$186 Billion From SNAP To Partially Offset The Cost Of Trillions In Tax Cuts.** “Last month, President Trump signed the One Big Beautiful Bill Act (OBBBA) into law.
