YOUTH POLL WORKER TOOLKIT

INTRODUCTION

Voting is a fundamental right, and open and accessible elections are key to protecting your right to vote. Unfortunately, many precincts during elections experience problems such as long lines, confusion over ID requirements, and provisional ballot issues. Well-prepared and well-trained poll workers can sometimes help with those problems.

By having poll workers ensure open and accessible elections, Democrats can take back the White House and Senate. But we need your help. Many states allow high school and college students, including sixteen- and seventeen-year-olds to become poll workers. We hope you can offer your own time to be a poll worker in 2019 and 2020.

POLL WORKER RESPONSIBILITIES AND COMPENSATION:

Poll worker responsibilities may include but are not limited to: setting up the voting equipment, checking in voters, processing ballots, assisting voters with accessibility issues, and closing down/securing the voting site at the end of the day. Some counties also require attending poll worker training. Please contact your county board of elections office for a complete list of responsibilities.

Depending on where you live, you may be eligible for a stipend ranging from \$65 to \$200.

POLL WORKER QUALIFICATIONS:

STATE-BY-STATE DIFFERENCES FOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

The following will detail differences by state for high school students. College students over the age of eighteen typically have the same eligibility as other residents over the age of eighteen. Counties may have additional qualifications. Please check in with your local county board of elections for more detailed information.

Unless otherwise noted in the following table, student poll workers will also receive compensation. Positions can also vary (e.g. registration official, vote counter, etc.) based on the state or county. Not all states call their election administrators poll workers. Your state may use the term "poll official," "election official," or "election judge." Please check with your county board of elections office for additional information as youth poll working may differ between counties as well.

Alabama	 Effective September 1, 2019, persons under the age of eighteen can serve as unpaid intern poll workers. You must be: Age of sixteen or older Recommended by a principal or other school official, or by the individual responsible for the student's home instruction program. A resident of the county or municipality for which the appointment is made Enrolled as a junior or senior or the equivalent in a public high school, an accredited private high school or a home instruction program or be enrolled in a two-year or four—year institution of higher education. 	Political parties or the Delaware Department of Elections can nominate full time students to serve as poll workers if they will be: • Sixteen by November 1 in the year of the general election • Delaware residents • Have the signed permission of their parent and principalThere are limits on the number of students that can serve per district. Political appointees are given priority The Department of Elections can appoint students younger than 18 enrolled at least half-time at colleges or universities in the county they will serve, if they present authorization from a faculty member or dean
